## Put government spending data online

Fortunately, the idea of increasing the transparency and accountability of government spending by putting the data. online for citizens to see is a very good idea - one that we may see implemented soon in Hamilton County, thanks to a proposal by Commissioner Pat DeWine. Hamilton County would be one of the nation's first counties to put spending data online. DeWine wants to have the site up by July 1 with all current documents online by the end of the year. Based on a similar program in Milwankee, he estimates the cost to \$10,000.

The goal, he said, would be to "disclose spending at the greatest level of detail." We hope that becomes the case nowhere in this year's session. that such a site is fully searchable, with expenditures fully itemized. Actual contract language should be included, and there should be as few exemptions as possible in the types of data posted. It's a good idea that advances a core concept in American life - that government should be open and accountable to the people.
